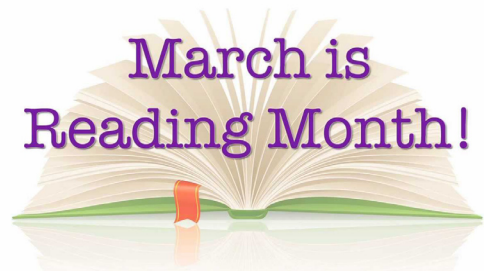

# 2018 MICHIGAN NOTABLE BOOKS

The Library of Michigan has announced its Notable Books for the year. Each year, the Library selects 20 volumes from those published in the prior year. The books are about or set in Michigan (or the Great Lakes region) or were written by a Michigan author. The list began in 1991 and is "designed to pay tribute and draw attention to the many people, places and things that make life in Michigan unique and vibrant."

The books on this list are available at the St. Clair Shores Public Library or through one of the cooperative libraries.

*Arthur Vandenberg: The Man in the Middle of the Century* by Hendrik Meijer

A biography of the US Senator from Michigan.

*August Snow* by Stephen Mack Jones

A murder mystery set in Detroit's Mexicantown neighborhood.

*Black Detroit: A People's History of Self-determination* by Herb Boyd

A look at the evolving culture, politics, economics, and spiritual life of Detroit.

*Brewed in Michigan: The New Golden Age of Brewing in the Great Beer State* by William Rapai

This book looks at the forces behind the leading craft breweries in the state that contribute over \$1.8 billion annually to the economy.

*The Dawn of Detroit: A Chronicle of Slavery and Freedom in the City of the Straits* by Tiya Miles

Miles has "pieced together the experience of the unfree—both native and African American—in colonial Detroit."

*Death and Life of the Great Lakes* by Dan Egan

This examination of ecological damage in the lakes mixes the story of the lakes with ways to restore and preserve them for future generations.

*Designing Detroit: Wirt Rowland and the Rise of Modern American Architecture* by Michael G. Smith

An examination of one of the early 20th century's "modern" designers of architecture.

*Detroit 1967: Origins, Impacts, Legacies* edited by Joel Stone

This volume begins with colonial slavery, works through the events of 1967, and culminates with an examination of the state of race relations today and suggestions for the future.

*The Goat Fish and the Lover's Knot* by Jack Driscoll

10 stories of fictional individuals set mostly in Michigan's northern Lower Peninsula.

*Grown-up Anger: The Connected Mysteries of Bob Dylan, Woody Guthrie and the Calumet Massacre of 1913* by Daniel Wolff

This is a biography of Dylan and Guthrie and also a

murder mystery and a history of labor relations, socialism, business and greed.

*Harborless* by Cindy Hunter Morgan

This collection of poems is informed by shipwrecks of the Great Lakes.

*The Kelloggs: The Battling Brothers of Battle Creek* by Howard Markel

The true story of the life-long competition between a physician who was also an author and health-magazine publisher and his younger brother, the founder of the Battle Creek Toasted Corn Flake Co.

*Marlena: A Novel* by Julie Buntin

The story of two teens, Cat and Marlena, and their year of adventures with the results of their time together coming to the fore years later.

*The Marsh King's Daughter* by Karen Dionne

When the Marsh King escapes from prison, Helena is the only one who can track him, thanks to the skills he taught her as a child.

*Rowing Inland* by Jim Daniels

This book of poems looks at the Detroit area of the author's youth and his family's challenges.

*Sailing into History: Great Lakes Bulk Carriers of the Twentieth Century and the Crews Who Sailed Them* by Frank Boles

This volume examines the seamanship, cargo, competition, cooperation, technology, engineering, business, unions, government decisions, and agreements that came together to create the story of shipping on the Great Lakes.

*Saving Arcadia: A Story of Conservation and Community in the Great Lakes* by Heather Shumaker

The four-decade story of a magnificent sand dune on Lake Michigan and the people who care about it.

*We're Going to be Friends* by Jack White; illustrations by Elinor Blake

This adaption for children of a White Stripes' song tells the story of Suzy as she goes to school and finds a friend.

*The Year of the Pitcher: Bob Gibson, Denny McLain and the End of Baseball's Golden Age* by Sridhar Pappu

The story of the 1968 baseball season, two pitchers and the World Series.

*Zingerman's Bakehouse* by Amy Emberling and Frank Carollo

Stories about the start of the Bakehouse in Ann Arbor and 65 meticulously tested, carefully detailed recipes from brownies and sour cream coffee cake to Jewish rye, challah and sourdough.

## GENEALOGY GROUP MEETINGS

### March 22—Irish Genealogy

Bill O'Reilly and Becky Layne O'Reilly will speak on the records genealogists consult, present an overview of Irish administrative divisions, review the differences between Northern Ireland and the Republic of Ireland and their records, and address the Scots-Irish question.

The O'Reilly's will review what records exist, which were destroyed in the Irish Civil War, what repositories are open, and what resources are available on-line. They will also mention tips and tricks for getting past brick walls and include real-world Irish genealogy research examples.

Mr. and Mrs. O'Reilly run the business My Ancestry, which they began in 2011. Bill earned a certificate in Genealogical Research from Boston University and is president of the Irish Genealogical Society of Michigan. Becky has taken numerous genealogy courses and serves on the board of the Irish Genealogical Society.

### April 26—French Records

Elizabeth White will speak about the changes to the French language over time and what this means to genealogy researchers using French language records. Using some original documents and highlighting passages where Old French is used and how Old French differs from Modern Day French, she will explain how to interpret older records.

Elizabeth White, a resident of St. Clair Shores, received her Ph.D. in French from Michigan State University in 2016. She has taught French and worked as a researcher using French language documents.

**Both presentations will take place in the Local History Center at 7:00 PM.** No genealogy experience is required to attend; all are welcome!

## MAISON LECTURE SERIES

The St. Clair Shores Historical Commission is pleased to present the Joseph Laurence Maison series of lectures.

Joseph and Elizabeth Maison's daughter, Lorelei Maison Rockwell and her husband Wayne Tilton Kennedy, have underwritten a series of three lectures on topics such as natural history, hunting, boating, fishing and gardening. These lectures have been held each spring since 2003 in memory of Joseph Laurence Maison.

The lectures are free and open to the public; they are held in the Gilstorf Meeting Room at **7:00 PM**. No registration is required.

On **Wednesday, March 14, 2018**, experts from English Gardens will present "New Plants for 2018." Join us as we see what new plants will be available to make our gardens and our planters beautiful for the upcoming growing season.

Today, 10 second-generation owners oversee the day-to-day operations of five retail stores and a full-service landscape design and installation company. On **Monday, April 30, 2018** Roger LeLievre, the editor of *Know Your Ships: Guide to Boats & Boatwatching on the Great Lakes and St. Lawrence Seaway* will be here to discuss the ships of the inland lakes as well as their cargo, ports, and other fascinating nautical lore. *Know Your Ships* will be celebrating its 59th season this year. Roger will have books for sale and will be signing books after his presentation.

Roger LeLievre grew up watching Great Lakes ships. At 18 he shipped out on the Ford Motor Co. ore boat Ernest R. Breech. Editor of *Know Your Ships* since 1995, his first contact with the publication was in 1968 when one of his photos was published in the book. He is president of the Marine Historical Society of Detroit and the vice president of the Great Lakes & Seaway Shipping On-line Inc., the non-profit web site more commonly known as BoatNerd.com.
