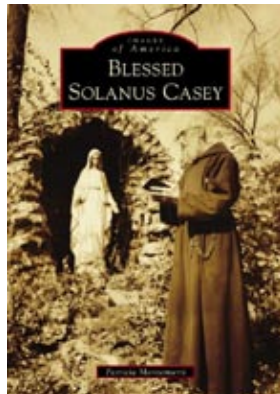

The Michigan Department of Education and the Library of Michigan have announced the 2019 Michigan Notable Books. These books were published in 2018 and are about or are set in Michigan or the Great Lakes region, or are written by a Michigan author. Included are fiction, non-fiction and youth books.

Abbott Saladin Ahmed

Set in 1970s Detroit, journalist Elena Abbott uncovers supernatural forces being controlled by a secret society of the city's elite tied to crime.

Across the Great Lake Lee Zacharias

A five-year-old girl traveling with her father in 1936 on a ship across Lake Michigan sees a ghost ship.

Beautiful Music Michael Zadoorian

In 1970s Detroit, Danny is a pop radio-loving loner balancing a dysfunctional home life with the realities at a high school marked by racial turbulence.

Betty Ford: First Lady, Women's Advocate, Survivor, Trailblazer Lisa McCubbin

Ford spoke about taboo subjects including her own addiction, sparking a national dialogue and helping to revolutionize treatment and inspire the modern concept of recovery.

Building the Modern World: Albert Kahn in Detroit

Michael H. Hodges

Kahn was a noted architect involved in numerous world events whose design influence is still reflected in modern buildings.

Drum Roll, Please Lisa Jenn Bigelow

This is a story about a girl who finds that music makes her a stronger person as change happens at band camp.

Elemental: A Collection of Michigan Creative Nonfiction

Anne-Marie Oomen, Editor

23 of Michigan's best known essayists write about the state. Contributors include Jerry Dennis, Jessica Mesman, Toi Dericotte, Mardi Jo Link and Keith Taylor.

Faygo Book Joe Grimm

This is the social history of a pop company from 1907 Detroit that has forged a bond with a city and its residents.

Hard Stuff: Dope, Crime, the MC5 & My Life of Impossibilities Wayne Kramer

This is a story of the personal struggle of an addict and an artist with a twist: he's here to remind us that revolution is always an option.

Lake Michigan Mermaid: A Tale in Poems

Linda Nemeč Foster and Anne-Marie Oomen

The tale of a telepathic conversation between a lost young girl and the mermaid who saves her in more ways than one; accompanied by powerful illustrations.

Manoomin: The Story of Wild Rice in Michigan

Barbara J. Barton

Manoomin focuses on the rice beds that once existed in Michigan, why many disappeared, and the efforts to restore and protect the plant.

Nature's Friend: The Gwen Frostic Story Lindsey McDivitt

This tells the story of Gwen's life and printmaking art that is dedicated to the wonder and beauty in nature.

Notes from a Public Typewriter Michael Gustafson, Editor and Oliver Uberti, Designer

Editor and designer have combined their favorite notes with essays and photos to create an ode to community and the written word that will surprise, delight, and inspire.

The Page Fence Giants: A History of Black Baseball's Pioneering Champions Mitch Lutzke

The Page Fence Giants were an all-star baseball team based in Adrian, Michigan. Despite a championship and a National Baseball Hall of Fame member, this is the first book written about this team.

The Poisoned City: Flint's Water and the American Urban Tragedy Anna Clark

The story of the activism by residents and outsiders to force Michigan to admit that the city's water was poisonous.

The Russian Five: A Story of Espionage, Defection, Bribery and Courage Keith Gave

This is the story from the day the Detroit Red Wings drafted their first two Soviet players in 1989 until they raised the Stanley Cup in 1997, then took it to Moscow for a victory lap.

Sister Pie: The Recipes & Stories of a Big-Hearted Bakery in Detroit Lisa Ludwinski

The unique and fruitful business model of the now-famous Detroit pie shop is detailed beside 75 unique recipes.

So Tall Within: Sojourner Truth's Long Walk Toward Freedom Gary D. Schmidt

Sojourner Truth's life began in slavery, was marked by her emancipation, and ended with her leadership in the movement for rights for both women and African-Americans.

The Truth Lies Here Lindsey Klingele

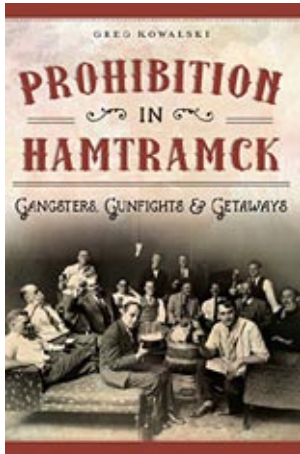
An aspiring journalist teams up with the nerdy boy next door to find her missing father when several townspeople turn up dead in the northern Michigan woods.

What the Eyes Don't See: A Story of Crisis, Resistance, and Hope in an American City Mona Hanna-Attisha

This is a book about how the right doctor discovered the elevated lead levels in the children of Flint and how she helped fight for justice, self-determination, and the right to build a better world.

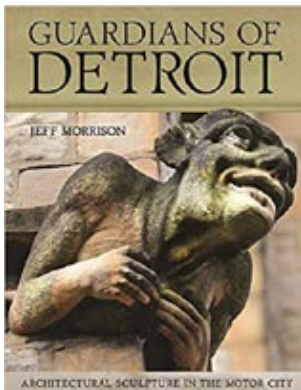
SPRING MAISON LECTURE SERIES

Black Terns are small, graceful birds that lead a double life: in summer in North America they are marsh birds, but in winter in South America they become seabirds along tropical coasts. Learn about the steep decline in numbers for this avian and how local research at the St. Clair Flats is adding to knowledge about the bird.



On **Wednesday, April 10** Roger LeLievre, editor of *Know your Ships*, will return with his new presentation "Hitchin' a Ride: Life on Great Lakes Freighters" which presents stories of what life on a big ship in the Great Lakes is really like.
